Concert Paper #2 is due no later than 5 days after having attended the performance.
- Quizzes 20 Points Each -4 Required. See course syllabus for quiz dates.
- Tests -50 Points each- 2 required. See course syllabus for major test dates.
- Final Exam -100 Points. See course syllabus for final exam time and date.
- Participation in Class Discussion -84 Points; Maximum of 3 Points per Class Session.
