

Gators Men's Basketball team takes LSSCC title

Contributing Writer - The University of Houston-Downtown (UHD) men's basketball club team (9-2) captured the LSSCC title by defeating Sam Houston State University (8-3) 44-36.

It was the third win by UHD over Sam Houston State this season.

If there was ever an example of the old adage that defense wins championships, it was on full display as the Gators put the clamps on all their opponents by holding them to well below their scoring averages.

Just like in the three previous games of the weekend, the Gators got off to a hot start by taking a 12-0 lead while the defense once again held their opponents scoreless well into the game.

The Bearcats did not score their first basket until the 13:40 mark of the first half. But, as in the previous games the Gators offense stalled once again allowing the Bearcats back into the game.

And just when it was thought that UHD would lose the lead, the Gators would surge ahead with some clutch baskets fueled by timely steals and blocks. It was as though the Gators were telling their opponents "we might be having trouble scoring but we're not going to let you score either."

This pattern would repeat itself the entire weekend.

Gators Bobby Hooper and Chris Mitchell led the Gators in scoring in both the final and semifinal Sunday and both grabbed clutch rebounds. Michael McCain had another masterful day running the point and facilitating the offense. Stephen Kidd and Justin Clay wreaked havoc on defense and on the boards.

But, make no mistake, this was a total team effort.

The team ran the game plan installed by head coach Leon Trimmingham and assistant coach Houston Posey to near perfection the entire weekend. That game plan

was drilled into the players by the two weeks of intense practices leading up to the tournament.

The win marked the third conference title

for the Gators and their first since fall 2007. UHD defeated Lone Star College-Cy Fair (6-5) 47-36 in the semifinal earlier on Sunday. Sam Houston State upset previously undefeated Texas Southern University (10-1) in the other semifinal. Gators Justin Clay and Stephen Kidd were named to the LSS-CC all-tournament team.

What one former student feels UHD needs



I was a student at the University of Houston-Downtown (UHD) for four semesters before I

graduated last spring. In that time I found myself wanting to love my university. I really want to be proud of UHD, and in some ways I am, but the school has so much unrealized potential. From the cumbersome name to the lack of student support, UHD has a lot of issues holding it back from becoming a truly great institution.

However, the school has a lot going for it too.

Location should be one of UHD's prime assets. This school is located in the heart of the fourth largest city in the country. The City of Houston and UHD should have a deep relationship, not just between city government and the school, but between the school and the community. I feel like the university could do more to connect with local citizens, from hosting health fairs and clinics, to entertainment events in the city. Anything they can do to give students realworld experience, to help the community, and to advertise the school's name should be done. It expands the reach of the university and enriches the academic environment.

Unfortunately, any program that sends students out into the community costs money and now is not the time to ask for more money from the state. Perhaps a more aggressive push to receive grant money

would help, but I will not pretend to have all of the financial answers. That is simply too tricky of a problem with too many variables. Even going after more grant money requires hiring more people to go find the money. The school definitely needs better funding though, that is clear.

Now that I have freed myself from financial concerns I can give you a wish list of things I would like to see UHD do that I think could benefit the school and the student body. Not all of them are financially feasible. In the economy that we have none of them are probably feasible, but better times will come again.

One issue that every four-year school I have ever heard of has is bureaucracy. I understand it is a bit inevitable, but dealing with UHD can be a hassle to say the least. Go turn in this form. Wait three days, come back, and turn in this other form. Go see this person. Oops, wrong person- you got to go over here. And no you cannot call on the phone; you must be here in person. I can tell you that it does not have to be that way. Go to Lonestar College in The Woodlands. Granted it is a much smaller student body, but they go out of their way to get people in school and to keep them there. I was enrolled at Lonestar for three semesters and I was amazed by how much more user-friendly it was. UHD needs to be user-friendly.

An issue that is unique to UHD is its name. I will not rehash this tired, heated debate, but I will say I am fed up with having to explain to everyone where I graduated from. It is a dumb name, it was always a dumb name, and no matter what the costs it should be changed. I liked the idea of Houston City University, but I am not married to that suggestion. Call it almost anything else you like, but it needs to convey to people that it is NOT the University of Houston.

Once the name is changed, or ideally during the process, the academic departments need to be expanded. More undergraduate and graduate degrees are needed. This is probably the most expensive suggestion I have, but the most important. In order to be taken seriously UHD has got to expand its academic offerings. If it were up to me, I would pick a few departments that are important to the region such as engineering or social sciences and I would expand those programs as much as possible. I would then pick a department or two that does not get as much attention from other schools in the area and target those areas for improvement.

UHD needs to give students more of a reason to enroll, other than lax standards for incoming freshmen and generous transfer requirements.

UHD will probably always be a commuter school, so student apathy will always be an issue. I would not expect the school to field a football team or invest a lot of money in athletics. However, I do expect the school to continue to grow and to give its students and alumni the best possible opportunities.

I think I have some ideas that would help and I have no doubt that the administration is continuously striving to improve the university.

They have the hard job- they have to figure out how to pay for these great new ideas.

UHD MBA program ready for Spring 2012

The University of Houston-Downtown (UHD) will offer a Master's of Business Administration (MBA) Program in Spring of 2012, designed with smaller class sizes and convenient class times for students working full-time.

Dr. Donald Bates, the Dean of UHD's College of Business, feels the program is well-designed.

Bates and the faculty wanted "to create an innovative and outstanding MBA program that will prepare business leaders with the knowledge, tools and critical-thinking skills needed to lead organizations," said Bates.

Bates has a very simple directive regarding the curriculum: "If an executive doesn't use it – don't teach it."

MBA programs are designed to offer further education in specialized areas such as finance, marketing, human resources or operations management. According to the UHD Website, "[the MBA] program has been created for motivated people who want to continue working in their full-time professional position while also pursuing graduate education. The MBA program at UHD is structured so that individuals spend just two evenings a week at UHD while in graduate study."

Although other masters programs at UHD are designed in the same two-year, smaller class size and individualized plans for graduate students, the MBA program is the newest of the masters offered at UHD. Other masters programs include the Master of Science in Professional Writing and Technical Communication, Master of Science in Criminal Justice, Master of Arts in Teaching and Master of Security Management for Executives.

It will be possible for full-time students to earn their degree in only two academic years because the program will use a hybrid format combining in-person and online classes that are delivered in 8-week terms. Students enrolling in the MBA program will be able to receive individualized attention and greater interaction with the faculty and other students because of the potential for smaller class sizes. These smaller classes will also allow students the opportunity to create a strong network of colleagues.

The UHD MBA gained approval by the University Of Houston (UH) System Board Of Regents on February 16, 2011. The College of Business began accepting applications on May 1, 2011 for the Spring 2012.

2011 Black friday sales higher than 2010

The Black Friday weekend ended on a high note this year, with stores reporting higher sales than in 2010.

Black Friday and now Cyber Monday (the Monday after Thanksgiving where companies give big discounts to online shoppers) are usually the hit in the pocket the retail sector needs to push through the holidays and into the next year.

Economists are happy with the results of this year's Black Friday. Despite high unemployment rates, Americans managed to beat last year's totals, and even surpassed the expectations set by economists for this year.

According to Kimberly Amadeo from About.com, the National Retail Association (NRF) had forecasted an increase in total holiday sales (which includes the whole shopping season, not just Black Friday) of 2.8 percent, or \$465 billion. Consumers spent a total of \$52.4 billion in the three days after Thanksgiving, making retail forecasts for the season plausible.

Black Friday also marks the beginning of seasonal temp jobs, which temporarily helps drop the national unemployment rate.

Despite the extra flow of cash, the NRF estimates only 480 thousand to 500 thousand seasonal workers will be hired this year, which is in line with last year's 495 thousand seasonal workers.

However, adding in the additional 100

thousand non-seasonal jobs the retail industry has already added since August, there is an increase from last year's numbers.

All those workers were needed, as stores opened even earlier than last year's Black Friday madness. Wal-Mart and Old Navy did not wait for Thanksgiving to end, and the retail giants opened their doors to shoppers at 10p.m.

"Stuffed to the brim from their holiday meals and eager to shop, more consumers than ever turned out for retailers' Black Friday promotions, a promising sign for the economic recovery," said NRF President and CEO Matthew Shay.

A survey conducted by the NRF found that 28.7 million people shopped online and at stores on Thanksgiving Day, up from 22.2 million last year.

To deal with the large amounts of people coming out to shop on Black Friday, the NRF released crowd management guidelines.

The guidelines "offer specific checklists for retailers to use when working on a crowd management plan" and go over "the factors that retailers should take into account for their emergency and crowd control plans." These guidelines are written to help retailers control the big crowds that are common in the holiday season, and especially Black Friday. In 2008 a seasonal worker at Wal-Mart was trampled to death by a mob of Black Friday shoppers.

Although this Black Friday spending spree brought in more money than the previous few years, it was average compared to the 2008 shopping season.

Amadeo thinks that this year's "increase could be because shoppers have delayed big purchases during the year to take advantage of holiday sales." Also, 60 percent of shoppers polled said they were buying non-gift items for themselves. These factors support a trend which has been called a "shift to thrift."

Americans may be buying more things and spending more money, but the focus is on buying higher quality items and incurring less credit card debt.

Kristen Stewart's acting is decent in this film, which is a huge surprise compared to the previous films when her performances were less-than acclaimed. The film could have benefitted from more scenes developing her thought on married life and on the whole pregnancy.

Abortion is hinted but not surprisingly quickly rejected, fueling the controversy on this film that many have about it being a constant public announcement. No sex before marriage, abortion is wrong...etc.

All in all, it delivers the highs and emotional drama that was sure to play out.

Fans can only hope that many of the unanswered questions get answered concerning the whole vampire/human baby and Bella's immortality in the next part to this fourth and final installment of the "Twilight" saga.

The wait for such answers continues and just like "Harry Potter: The Deathly Hallows Part 1", anticipation builds for the next movie in which we shall bid adieu to the characters of the "Twilight" saga.
